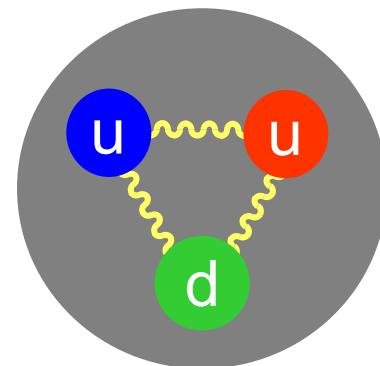

Structure

2 quarks up (2/3 e) + 1 quark down (-1/3 e) + strong interaction (gluons)

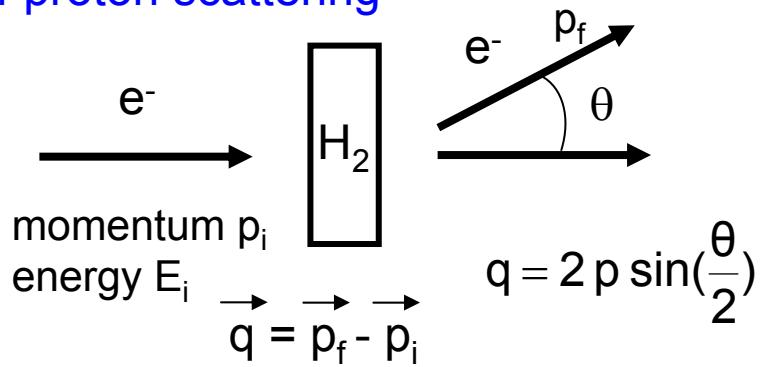


“proton size” $\lambda_C = \frac{h}{m_p c} \approx 1.3 \text{ fm}$

Proton charge radius : $r_p \sim 0.8 \text{ fm}$

$$r_p = \sqrt{\langle r^2 \rangle} \quad \langle r^2 \rangle = \frac{\int r^2 \rho(r) d^3r}{\int \rho(r) d^3r} \quad \rho(r) : \text{proton charge distribution}$$

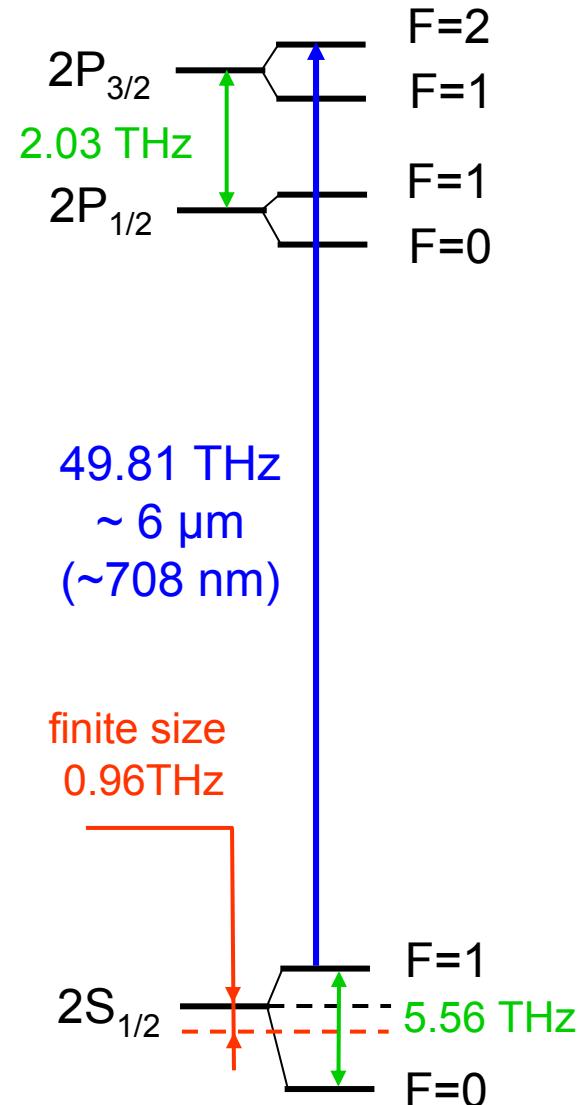
Laser chain



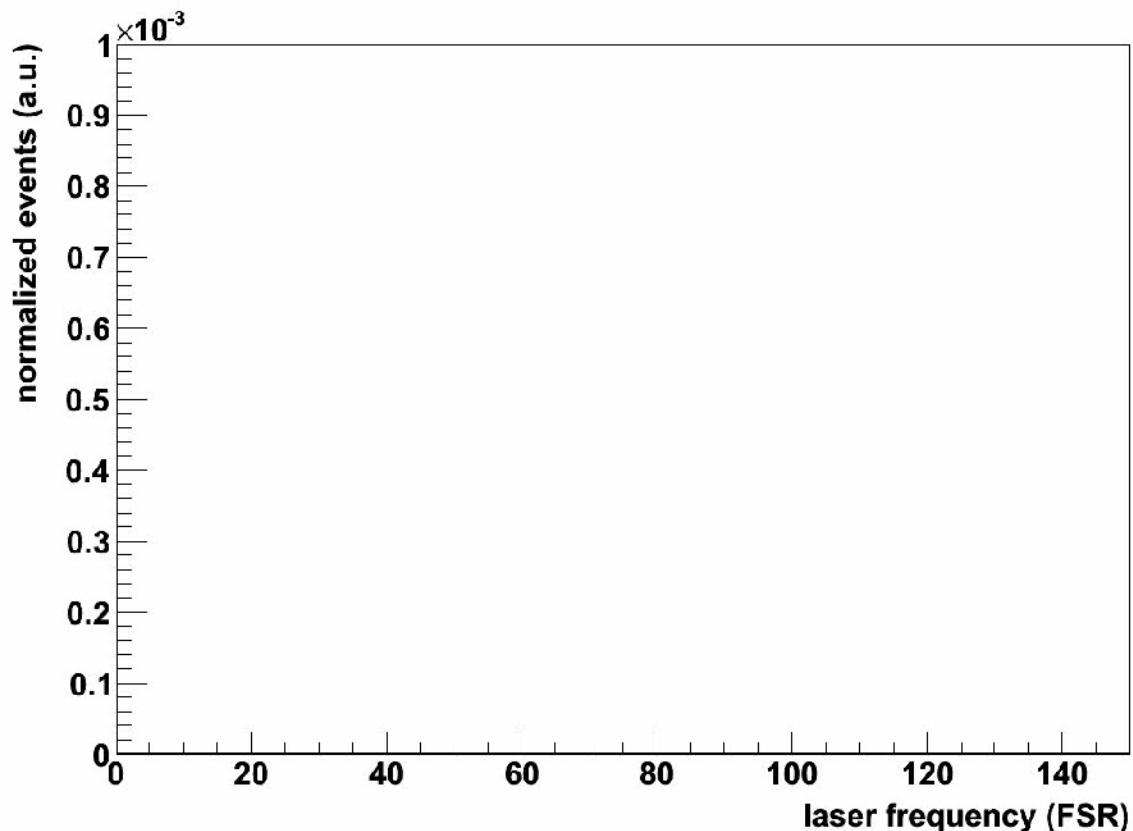
- Each single muon triggers the laser system (random trigger)
- 2S lifetime $\sim 1 \mu\text{s} \rightarrow$ short laser delay (disk laser)
- 6 μm tunable laser pulse (0.2 mJ)

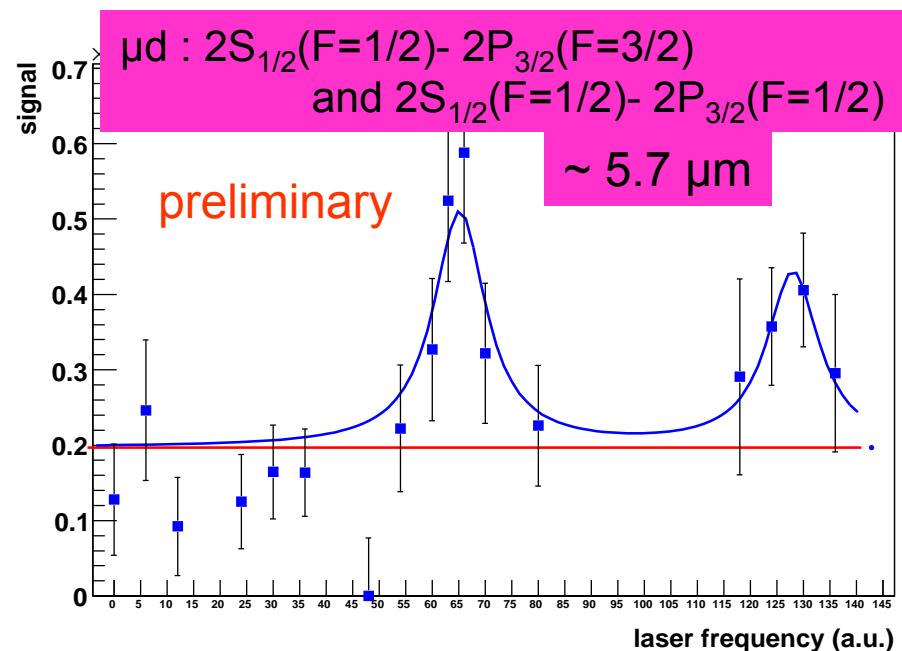
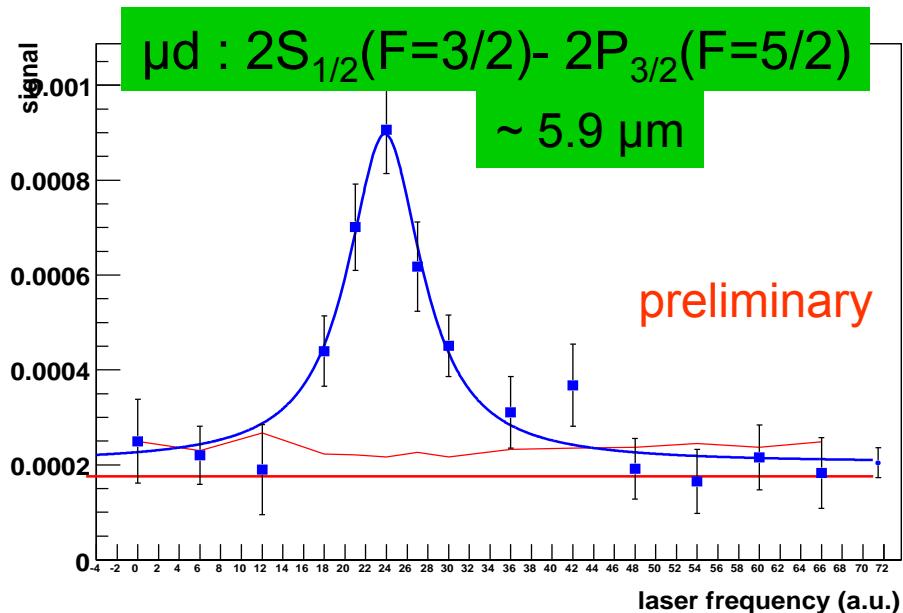
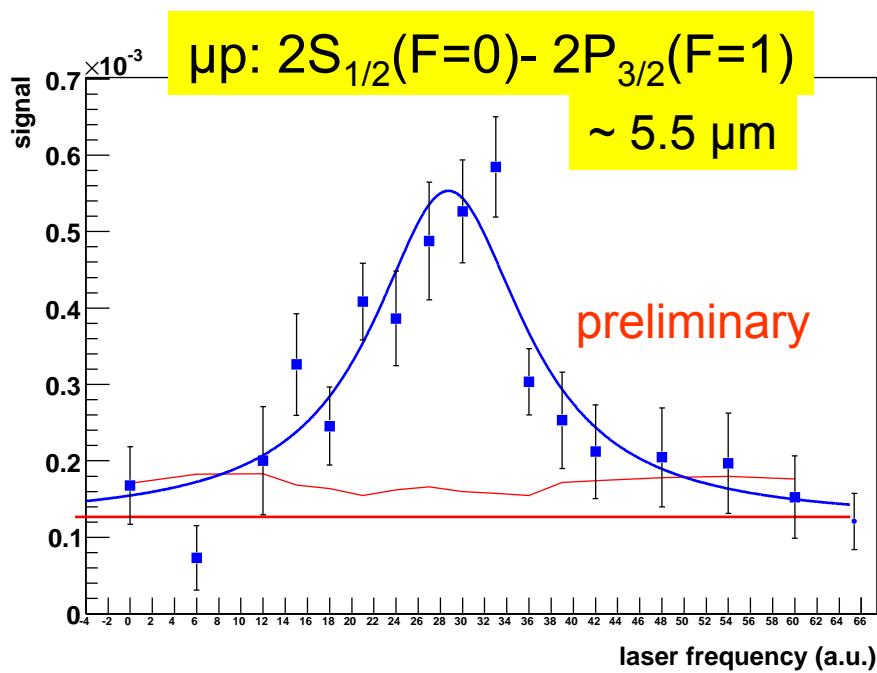

Other lines observed in μp and μd atoms

- 2nd μp line : at the correct position
hfs → Zeemach radius
- μd : not at the correct position with new rp and isotope shift
→ deuteron polarizability
- 2nd μd line : observation
→ check calculation

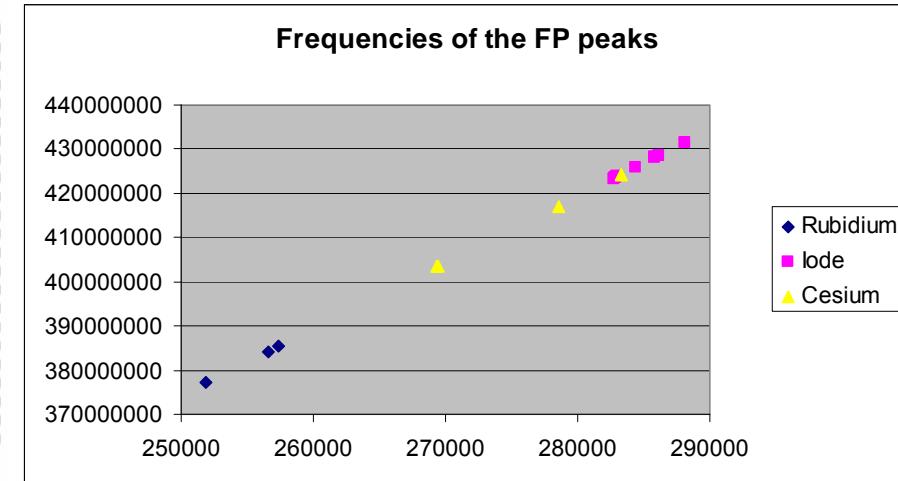
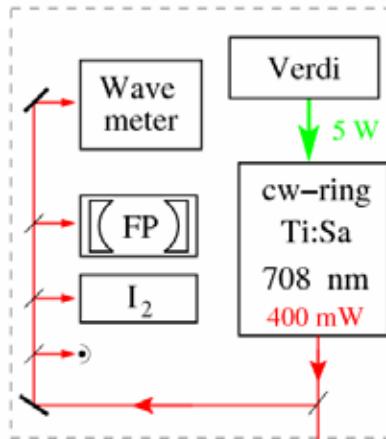
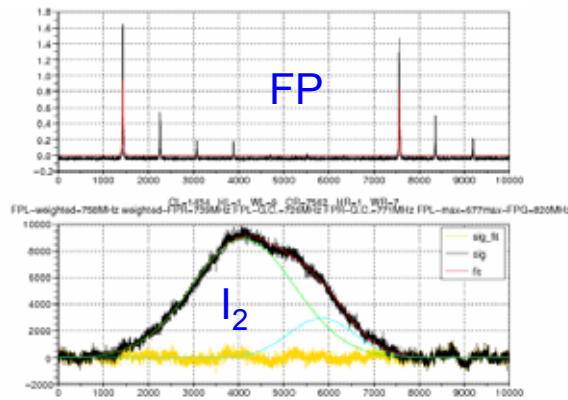
- Q-switch oscillator (cw prelasing mode → short delay between electronic trigger and opt. output (8mJ, xxx ns, delay 250ns)
- 12 pass amplifier (20m propagation) (42mJ)
- LBO frequency doubling 25mJ @ 515nm

- 50 mJ @ 515 nm, reliable laser
- delay electronic trigger/output pulse < 500ns
- random trigger ≥ 1.5ms

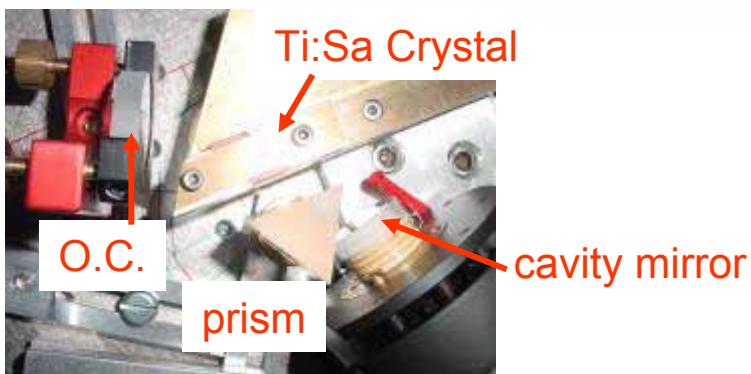

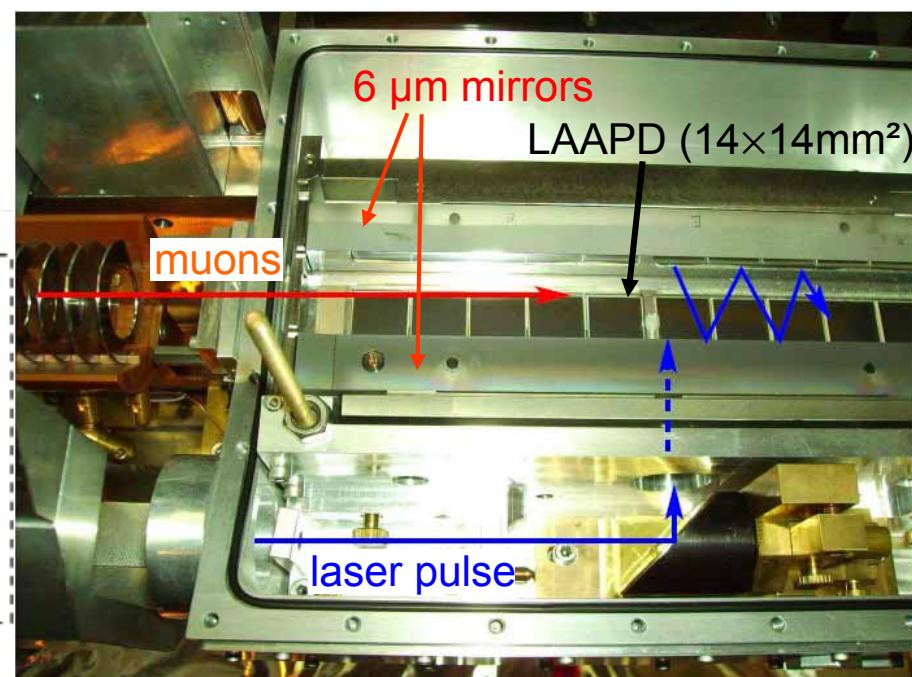
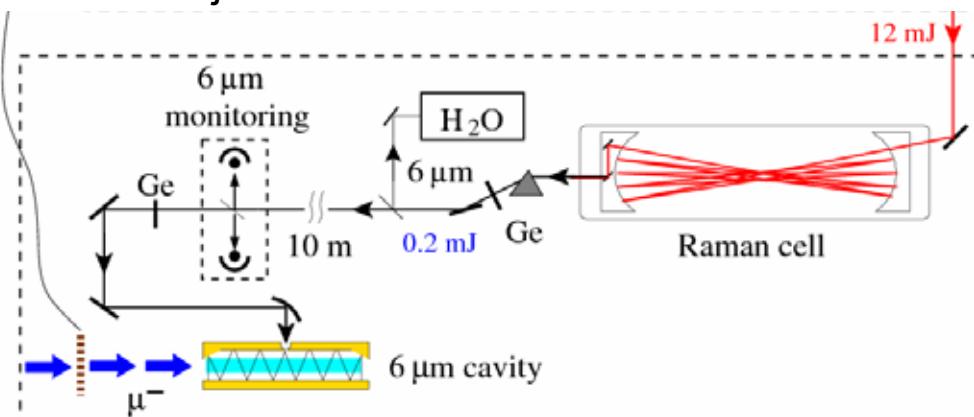


Laser chain : multipass cavity

→ illuminate at 6 μm all the muon stopping volume ($5 \times 15 \times 190 \text{ mm}^3$)



- coupling through a 0.63mm diameter hole
- $R=99.90\%$ at 6 μm
- 1000 reflections
- 0.15mJ injected \rightarrow 2S-2P saturated

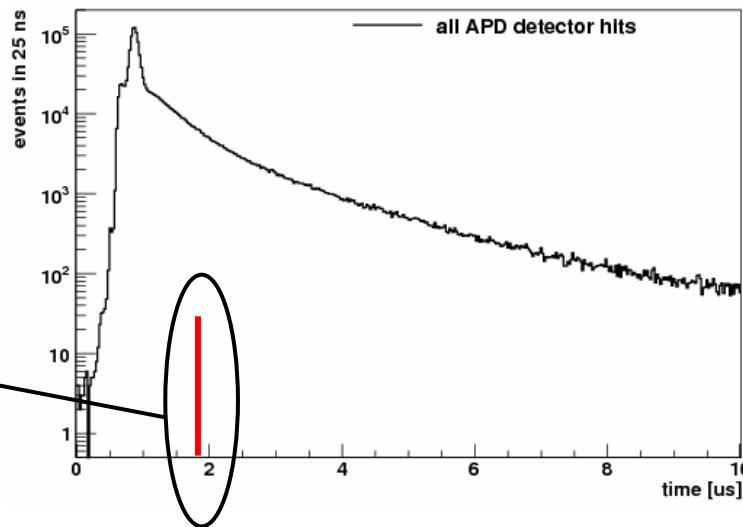

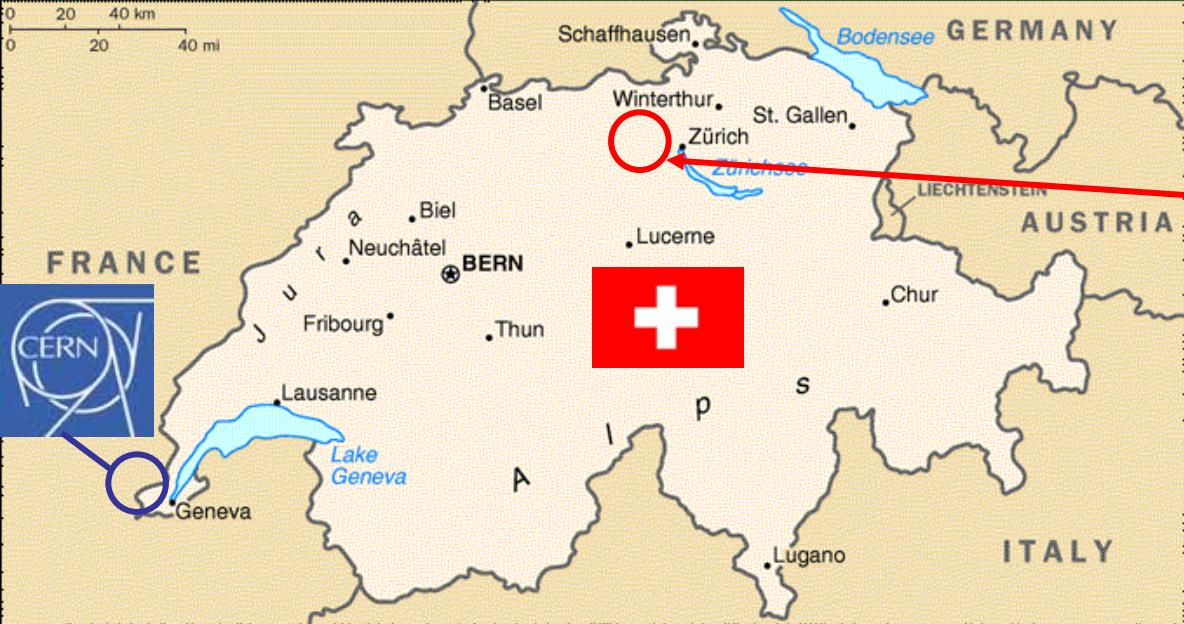
Experiment

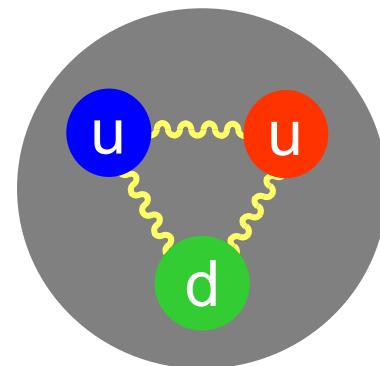

Proton

Structure

2 quarks up (2/3 e) + 1 quark down (-1/3 e) + strong interaction (gluons)



Proton charge radius : r_p

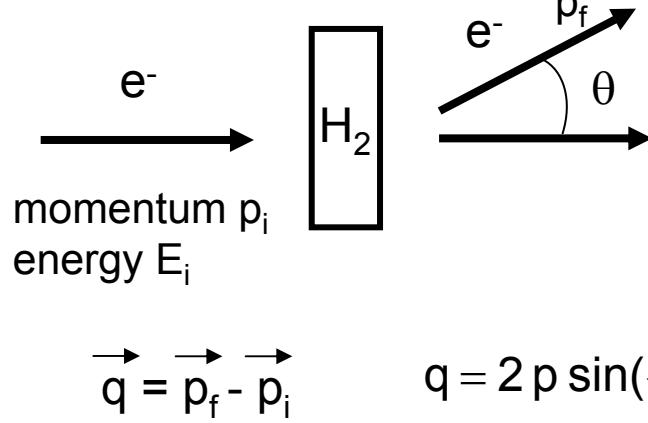
$$r_p = \sqrt{\langle r^2 \rangle} \quad \langle r^2 \rangle = \frac{\int r^2 \rho(r) d^3r}{\int \rho(r) d^3r}$$

$\rho(r)$: proton charge distribution

QCD Calculations

- proton mass (< 4%)
- r_p (< 5%)

hydrogen theory

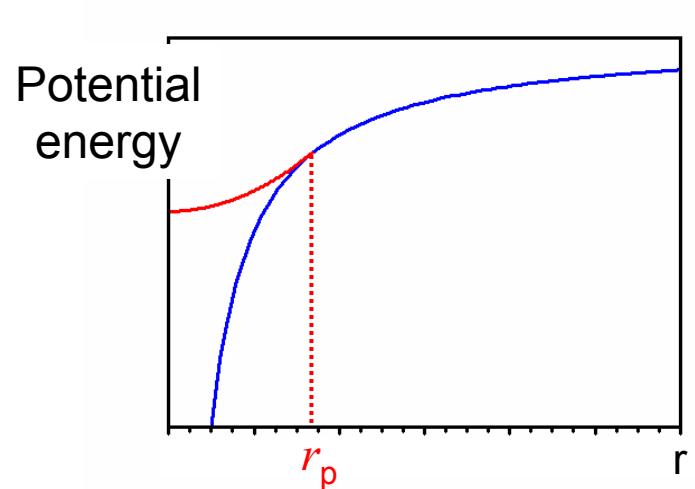

exact

not well known

- QED corrections ($1/n^3$)
- relativistic recoil
- charge radius of the proton ($1/n^3$)

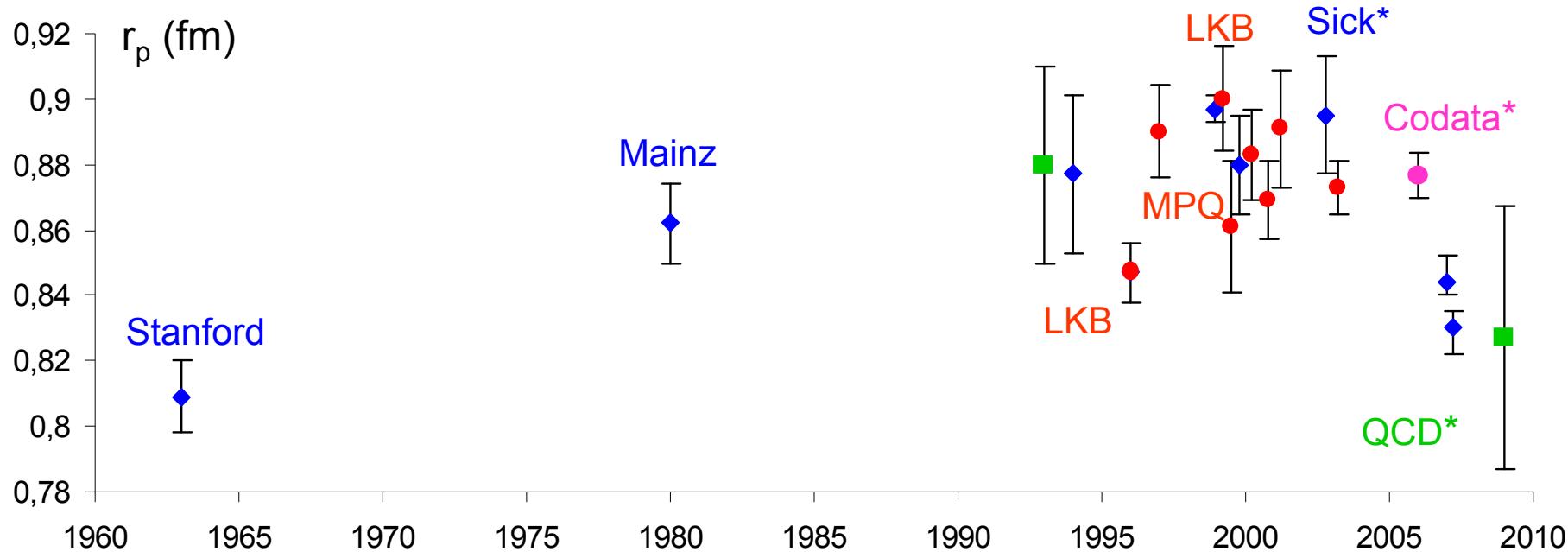

Linear combinations $\rightarrow R_{\infty}, L^{\exp}(1S)$

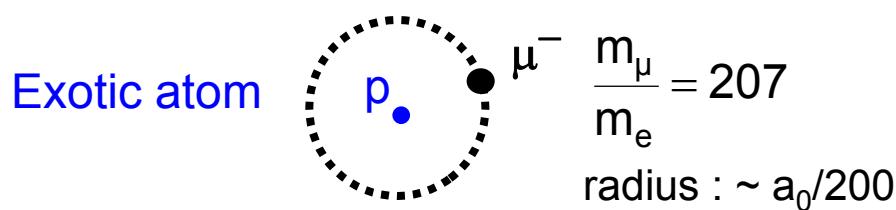
$$L^{\exp}(1S) = 8172.840 (19) \text{ kHz} + \text{QED} \rightarrow r_p (1\%)$$

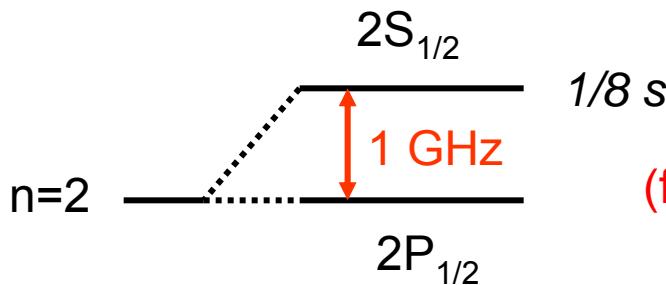

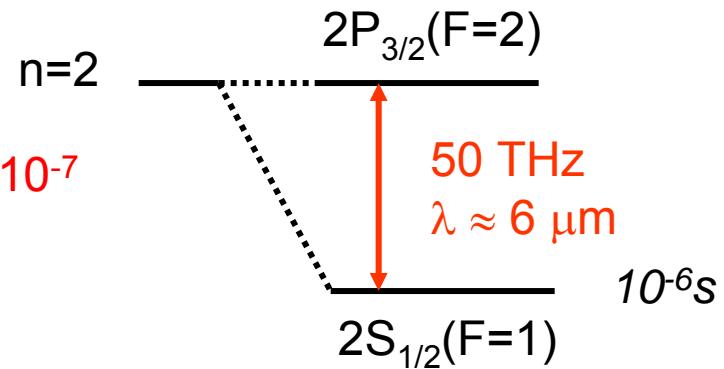

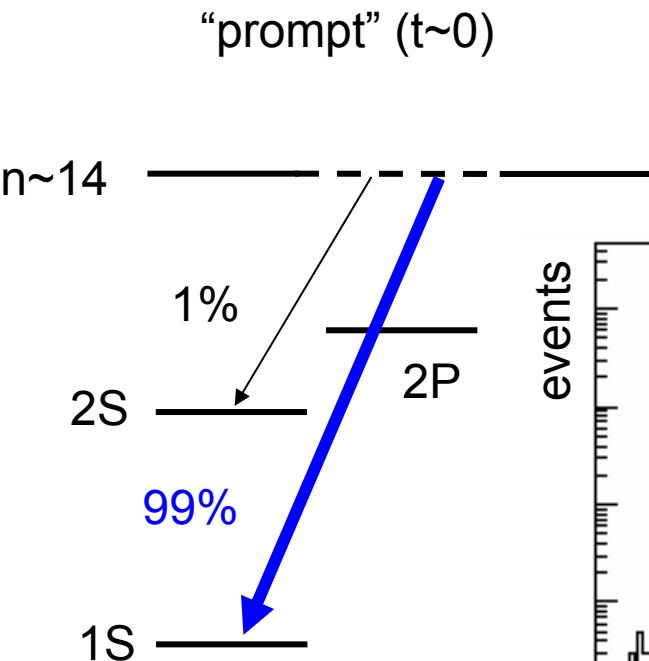
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Principle of the experiment

“prompt” ($t \sim 0$)

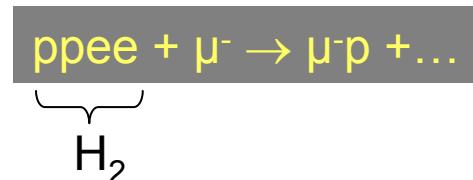


μ^- stop in H_2 gas

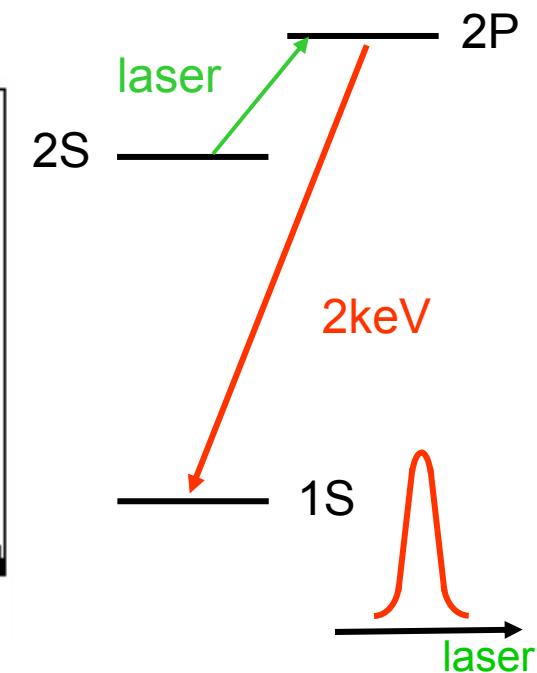
$\Rightarrow \mu p^*$ atoms formed ($n \sim 14$)

99%: cascade to 1S emitting
prompt K α , K β , ...

1%: long lived 2S state ($\tau \sim 1\mu s$ at 1mbar)



“delayed” ($t \sim 1\mu s$)

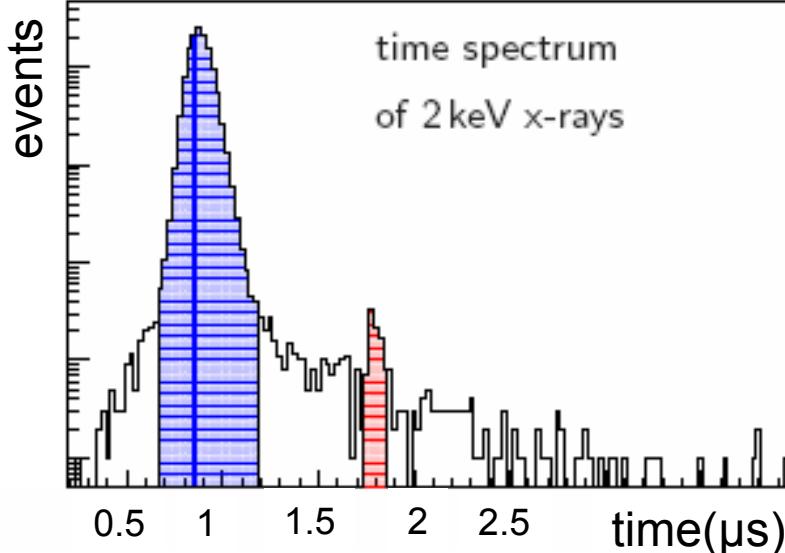


Fire laser ($\lambda \sim 6\mu m$, $\Delta E \sim 0.2\text{eV}$)

\Rightarrow induce $\mu p(2S-2P)$

\Rightarrow observe delayed K α x-rays

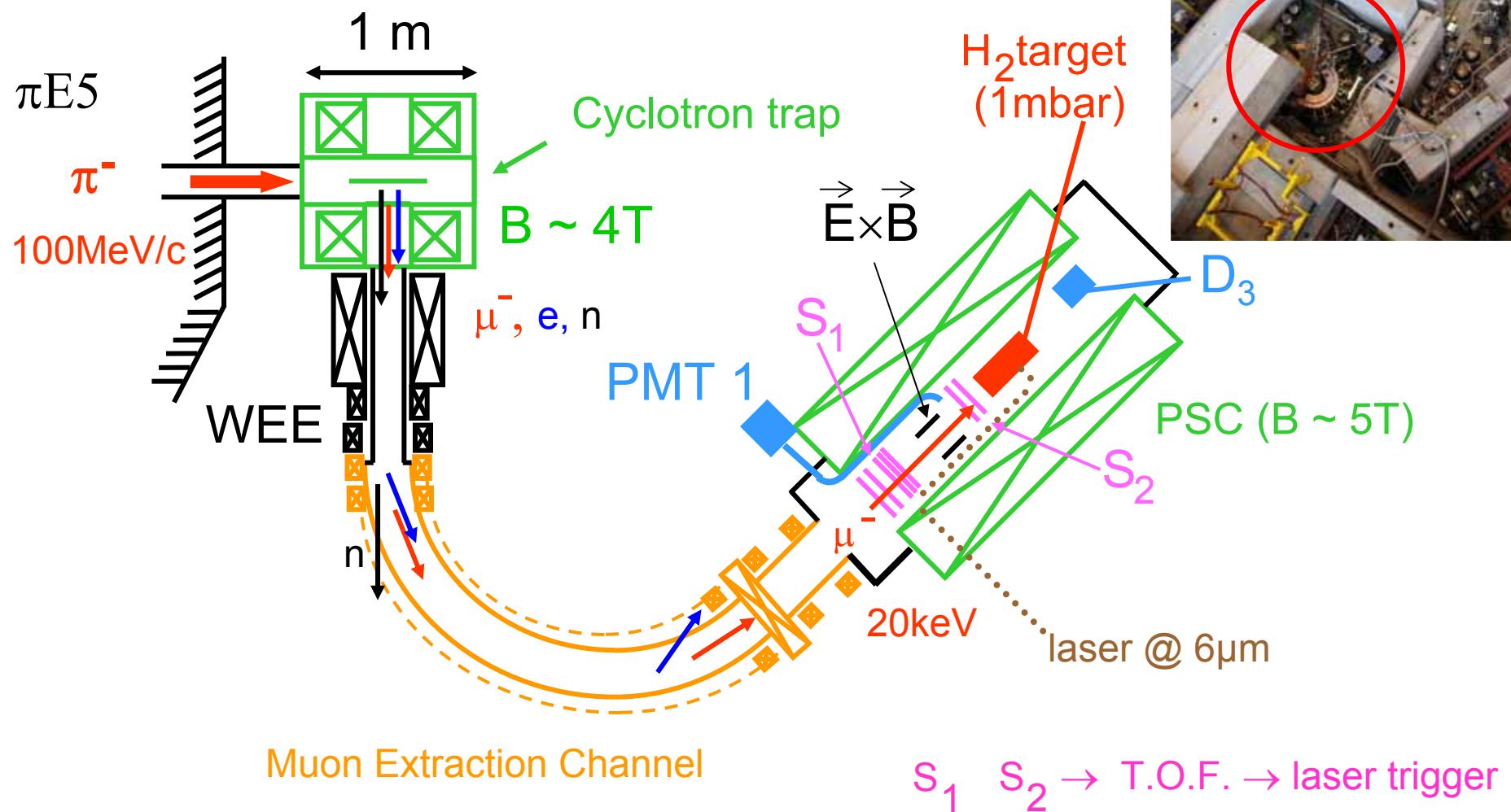
\Rightarrow normalize $\frac{\text{delayed K}\alpha}{\text{prompt K}\alpha}$ x-rays

p (500Mev, 2mA) → carbon target →

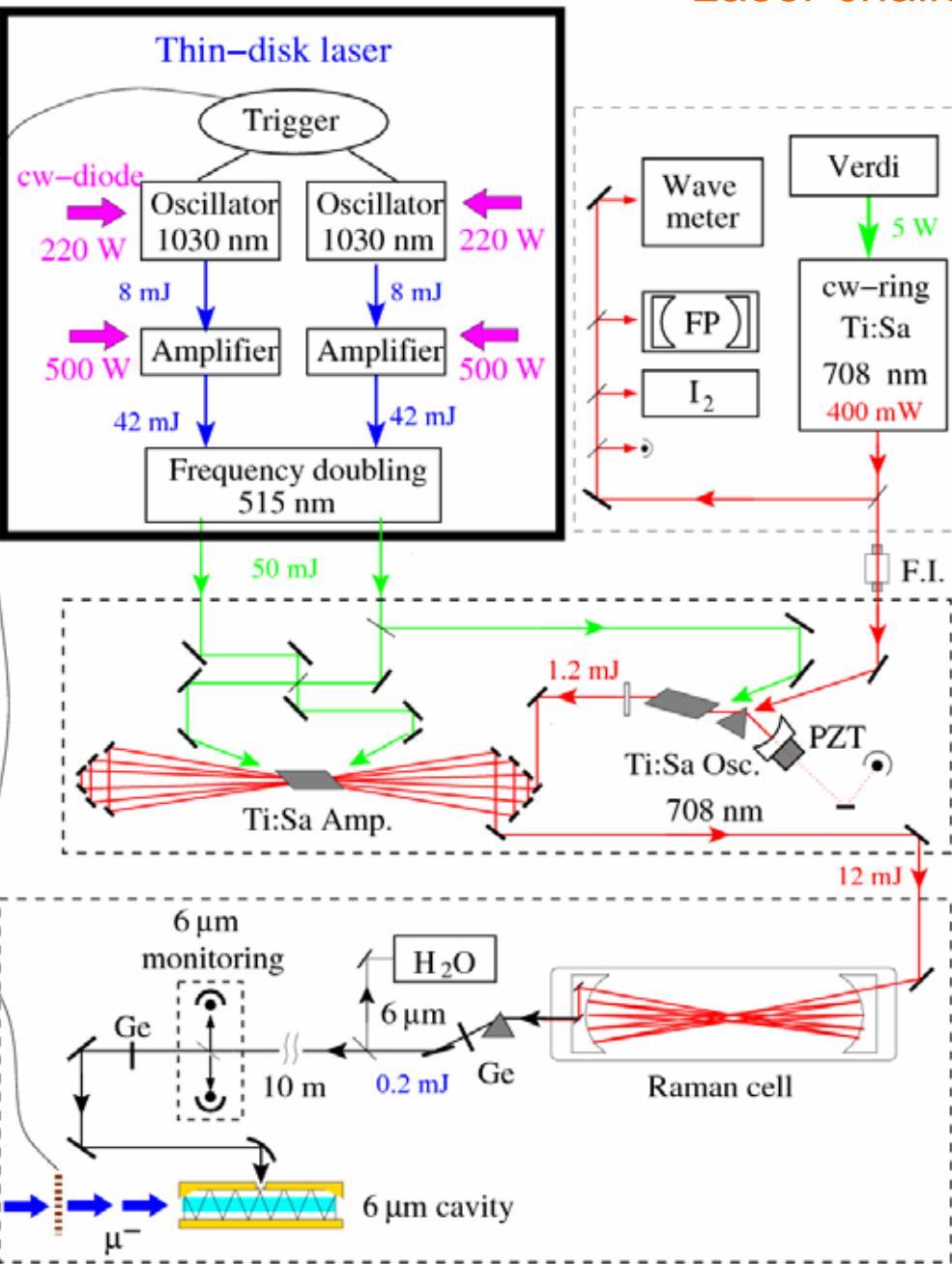

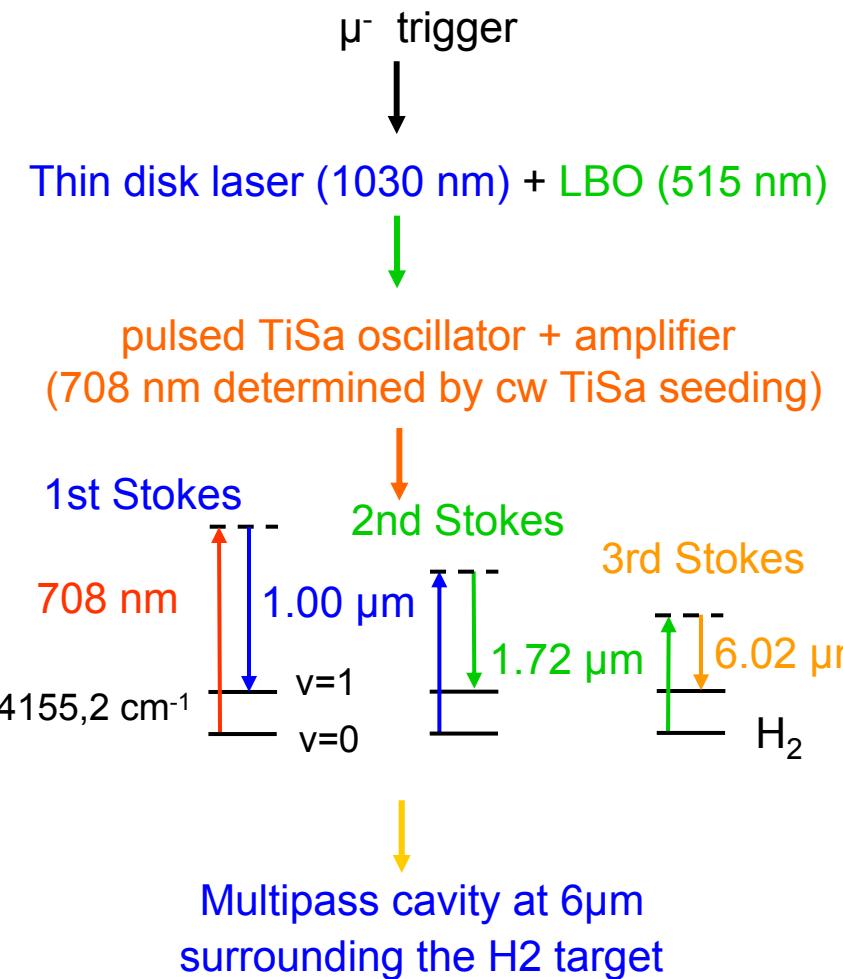
muon life in CREMA experiment

- pion π^-
- muon μ^-
- photon from scintillator

Laser chain



- Each single muon triggers the laser system (random trigger)
- 2S lifetime $\sim 1\mu\text{s} \rightarrow$ short laser delay (disk laser)
- 6 μm tunable laser pulse (0.2mJ)



X-rays analysis → noise rejection

Example : FP 900 - 11 hrs meas.

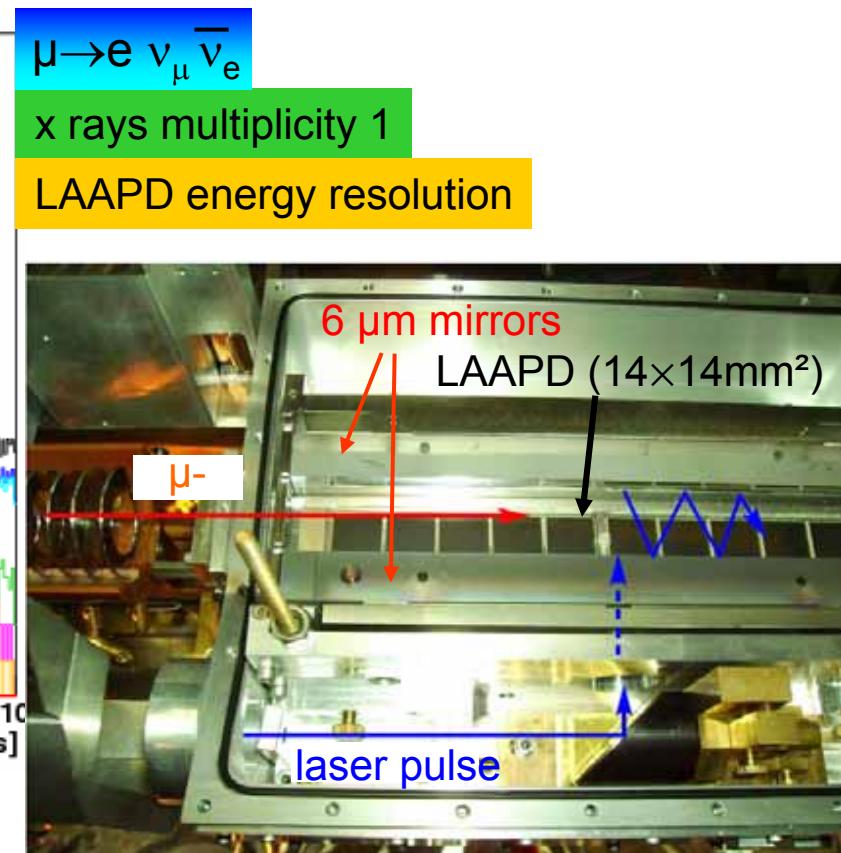
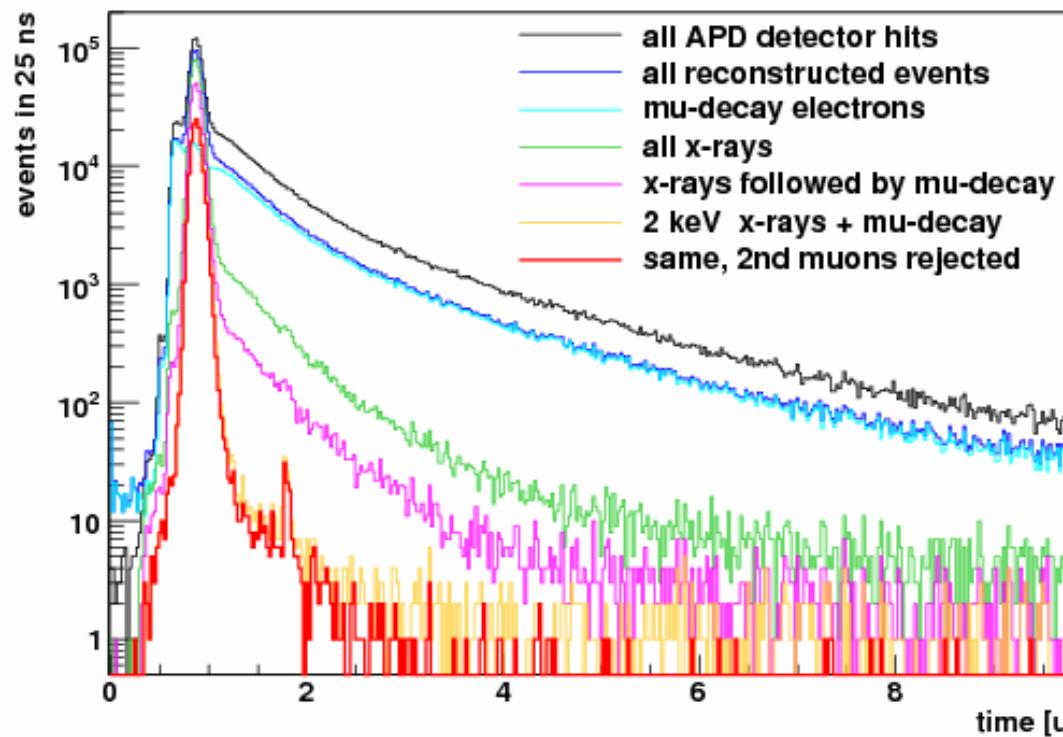
- 400 μs
- 240 laser shot/s
- 860 000 laser shot/hour
- 1.56 million detector clicks
- 19600 clicks in the laser region
- expected 2-3 laser induced events/hour !

time signature in LAAPD

- photon < 10keV → 1 shot in the LAAPD
- e^- in $B = 5\text{T}$ → many counts in detectors

energy signature in LAAPD

- $E > 8\text{keV} \Leftrightarrow$ electron
- $1\text{keV} < E < 8\text{keV} \Leftrightarrow$ X ray
- $E < 1\text{keV} \Leftrightarrow$ neutron



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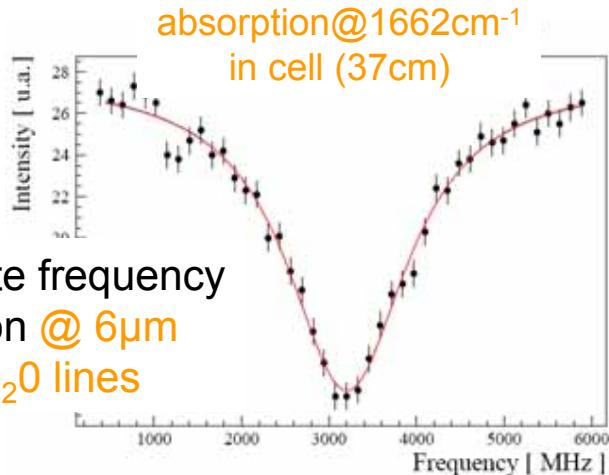
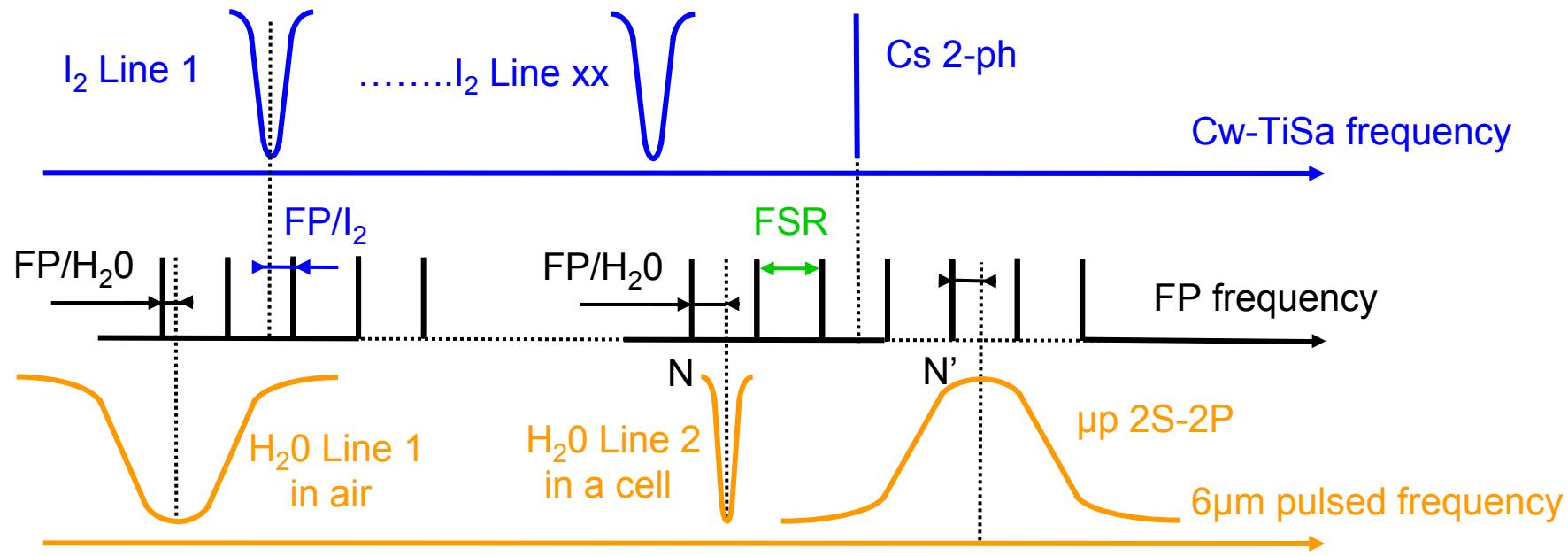
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Laser chain : frequency calibration

FSR measured/controlled in cw with I₂ (1 ph abs), Cs (2 ph fluo), Rb (2 ph fluo), lines



FP absolute frequency
calibration @ 6μm
with H₂O lines

$$v(\mu p:2S-2P) = v(H_2O \text{ Line 2}) + (N - N') \text{ FSR}$$

μp ($2S_{1/2}(F=1)$ - $2P_{3/2}(F=2)$) : uncertainty budget

Statistics

- uncertainty on position (fit) 700 MHz ($\sim 4\%$ of Γ_{nat})

$$\Delta v_{\text{experimental}} = 20 \text{ (1) GHz} \quad (\Gamma_{\text{nat}} = 18.6 \text{ GHz})$$

Sources :

- Laser frequency (H_2O calibration) 300 MHz
- AC and DC stark shift < 1 MHz
- Zeeman shift (5 Tesla) < 30 MHz
- Doppler shift < 1 MHz
- Collisional shift 2 MHz

TOTAL UNCERTAINTY ON FREQUENCY 762 MHz

Broadening :

- 6 μm laser line width ~ 2 GHz
- Doppler Broadening < 1 GHz
- Collisional broadening 2.4 MHz

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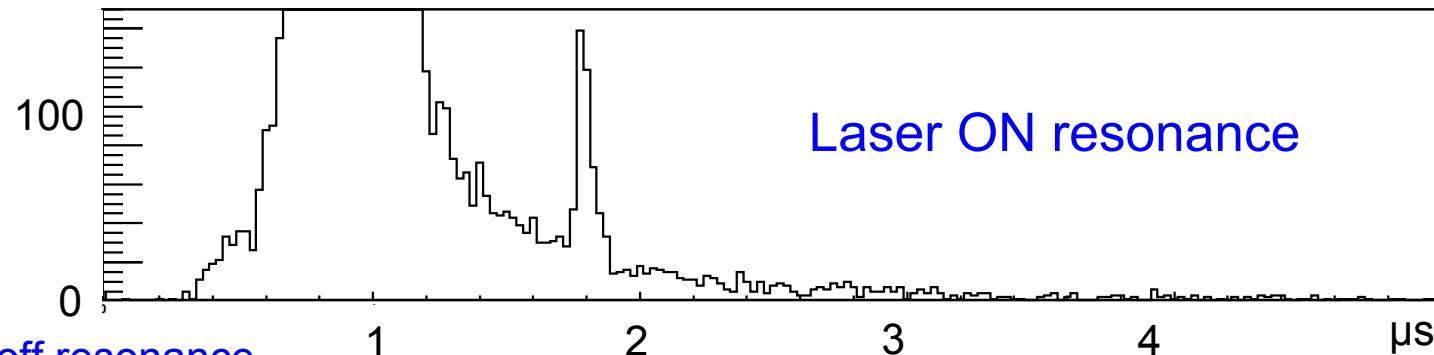
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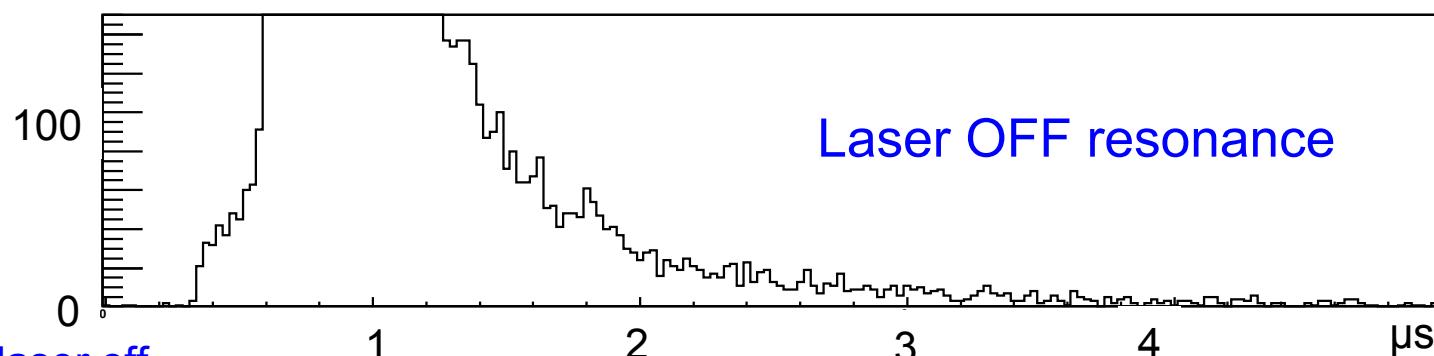

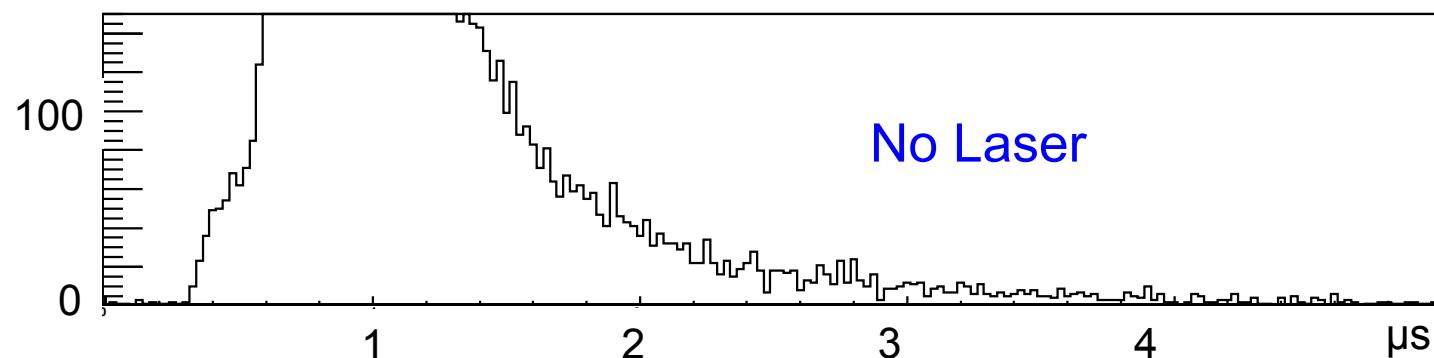

Muonic hydrogen Lamb shift

- check on line consistency of all publications (P. Indelicato, E. O. Le Bigot, F. Kottmann)
- independent QED calculations (P.Indelicato, P.J.Mohr) (large contributions : OK)
- check others theoreticians (PSAS 2010...)

Hydrogen spectroscopy, Rydberg constant R_∞ :

$$H : v_{1S-2S} = \frac{3}{4} R_\infty + L(\text{QED}, r_p)$$

$\uparrow \quad \uparrow$
 $(34 \text{ Hz}) \quad u_r(R_\infty) : 2S-nS/nD \ (n=8,12)$
 $\quad \quad \quad (\sim 7 \text{ kHz})$

$$cR_\infty = 3\ 289\ 841\ 960\ 360.9 \ (21.9) \text{ kHz } (6.6 \times 10^{-12})$$

$$cR_\infty = 3\ 289\ 841\ 960\ 250.9 \ (4.8) \text{ kHz } (1.5 \times 10^{-12})$$

but $\sim 5 \sigma$ shift (3.3×10^{-11})

Without Paris $cR_\infty = 3\ 289\ 841\ 960\ 379.8 \ (48.0) \text{ kHz } (14.6 \times 10^{-12})$

Codata 2006 “The experimental and theoretical H and D data remain highly consistent.”

First measurement of $1S-3S$ (LKB) : $2\ 922\ 743\ 278\ 678(13)$ kHz. EPJ D **60** p.243 (2010)

Prediction : $2\ 922\ 743\ 278\ 671.6(1.4)$ kHz PRL **95**, 163003 (2005)

“New physics”:

“We consider exotic particles that, among leptons, couple preferentially to muons and mediate an attractive nucleon-muon interaction. We find that the many constraints from low energy data disfavor new spin-0, spin-1, and spin-2 particles as an explanation.” PRL **106**, 153001 (2011)

Example of constrain : magnetic moment anomaly of the electron (Gabrielse, Kinoshita) $g-2=f(\alpha/\pi)$

With recoil (LKB) $v_r = \frac{\hbar k}{m(Rb)} \quad \alpha^2 = \frac{2R_\infty}{c} \frac{m(Rb)}{m_p} \frac{m_p}{m_e} \frac{\hbar}{m(Rb)}$ PRL **106**, 080801 (2011)

Prospect : muonic helium spectroscopy at PSI

2013....→ muonic helium spectroscopy

- μHe^+ spectroscopy + He^+ spectroscopy → QED test ($Z\alpha$)
- test of the spectroscopy of muonic system

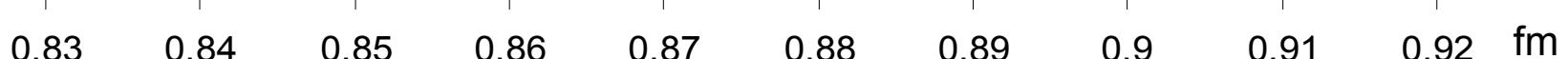

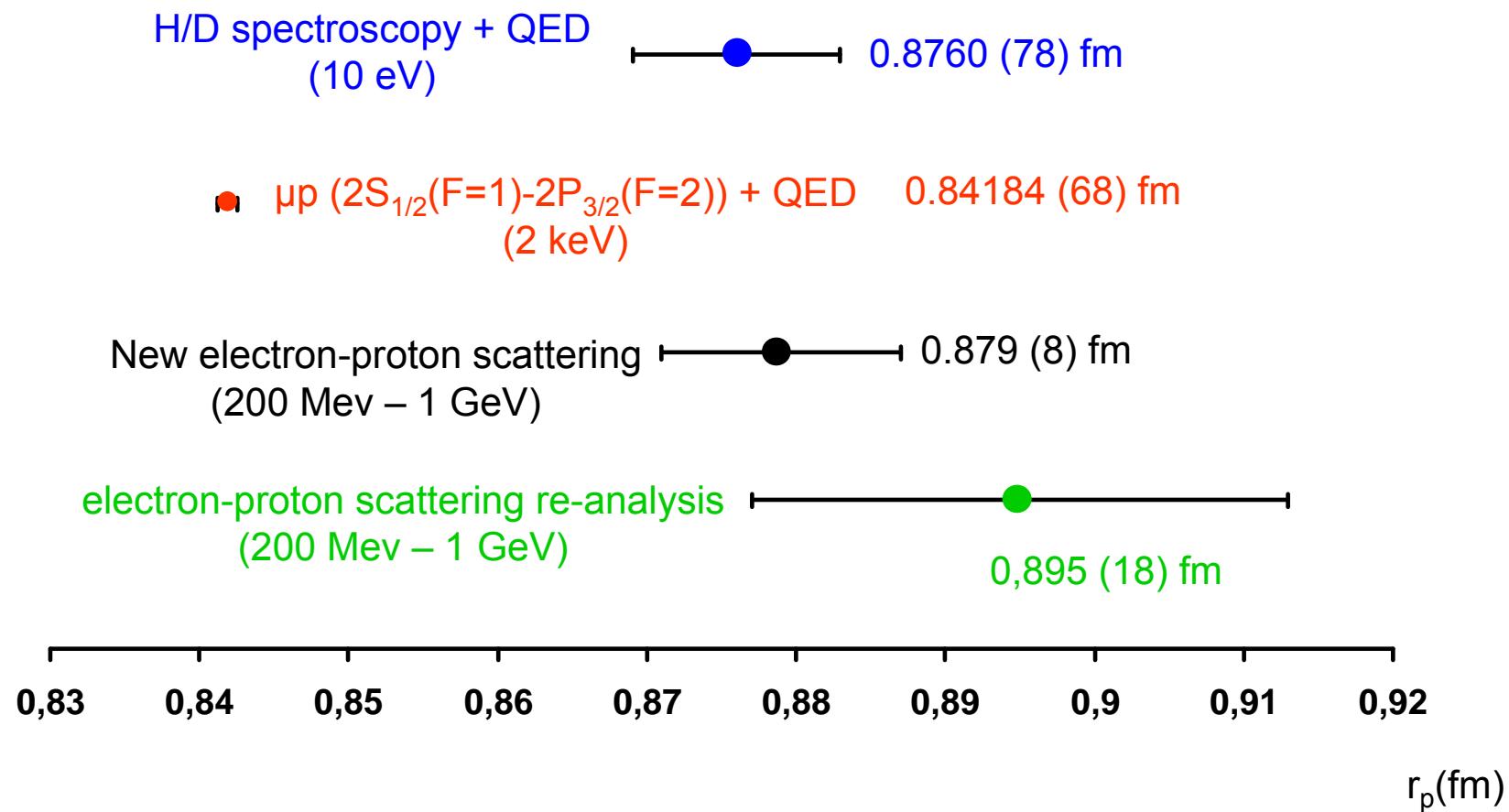

$$v (\mu p : 2S_{1/2}(F=1) - 2P_{3/2}(F=2)) = 49881.88 (76) \text{ GHz}$$

$$\Rightarrow r_p = 0.84184(36)(56) \text{ fm}$$
